internet sexuality for more than 15 years. He is the Associate Editor for CyberPsychology: Journal of Psychosocial Research on Cyberspace and is a member of the Editorial Board for Sexualization, Media, & Society. He is also a full member of the International Academy of Sex Research.



Pascal Lardellier is a Professor (information and communication sciences at the University of Burgundy, Dijon, France), also scientific Director of PROPEDIA, laboratory of « Groupe IGS », Paris. He is the author of twenty books covering several topics: social

uses of ICT by teen-agers, online dating, forms and functions of rituals in western societies, food, non-verbal communication...). Pascal has given hundreds of conferences worldwide, devoted to sociological and anthropological topics. He very often expresses his points of view and analysis in media.

And if you think this only encompasses the movie "Youve Got Mail" and online pornography, these are only a minimal part of a huge sociocultural phenomenon:

- Cyber dating and hookup culture
- Social media, sexuality and sexting
- Online voyeurism: webcamming, hidden cams and Mr. Skin
- Erotica and pornography websites
- Sex workers' platforms, websites and forums
- Digitally engineered sex: Teledildonics and sex robots
- The dark side: revenge porn, Internet-related child sexual abuse, etc.

All these sociocultural phenomena can be approached from various semiotic perspectives: as culturally codified forms of social life, where the generative method can reveal meaning making mechanisms; as new cognitive realities, where habit changing and embodiment matter to understand the pragmatics and realism of digital love and sex; as new generation modeling systems, where human desires and artificial intelligence join forces to create new cultural forms or as a biosemiotic challenge to some of humanitys most important vital functions.
